Group Lead Volunteer report 2024/2025



So, it's almost a year since we moved back into our HQ in Wroxham, there were a few minor things that had delayed us moving in floors not drying, mirrors not arrived and other minor things.

On the 18th of November our Beavers met in the new hall for the first time the other sections followed on (both Cub packs still meet as one until the end of term).

We had our official open day on the 30th November, this was a very well attended day with past and current members, local MP Steff Aquarone and many more people came to marvel at the transformation. It was a real pleasure to welcome members of the committee that built the old HQ. It was their hard work and fundraising that literally built the very foundations that this new building stands on today.

Andy P gave a fantastic welcome talk that involved Beavers Cubs and Scouts doing the unveiling of the plaque. Our local Vicar Liz blessed the building from the Juliet balcony.

It was quite obvious from that very first night that Beavers met there was an acoustics issue that no one had foreseen, the echoes around the room were bordering on unbearable. The grants board covered the cost of purchasing and the installation of acoustic panels in the main hall, this really did transform the building.

Our Group Christingle service in mid-December at St Marys Church Wroxham was very well attend.

The joint cub packs went bowling as there Christmas party, Scouts played games and had lots of party food.

The Climbing wall had its first inspection, this highlighted a lot of work was needed before it could be used. To date we are nearly there, thanks to being able to purchase a job lot of equipment from the District.

New lines and compass points painted on the floor meant we were almost finished, with the hoist due to arrive in March.

A fantastic jumble sale was held in February taking over £700.

Three members of the Leader team and a Young Leader attended a climbing instructor course, Mina attended an air pistol instructor course. The Group purchased VE day badges for every member.

The HQ has a couple of regular booking "cook stars" on Wednesday afternoons cooking classes for children and a counselling session on Mondays in one of our small rooms.

The HQ was used for an overnight Korea Jamboree staff reunion in May. The Group received a grant from the Shelroy Charitable Trust to fund the replacement of our archery equipment as quite a lot of our old equipment was deemed unsafe to use. We also received a donation from the Rotary to help pay for the landscaping around the camp fire area.

In early June we received the very sad news that Angela Stevenson had passed away. Angela was a Beaver Leader for a number of years followed by a long time on the Group Executive and was very instrumental in the planning of our very successful car shows. Even after stepping away from regular Scouting Angela continued to support the Group by helping at our fundraising events.

Our June bag pack at Roys raised just under £700 another good result.

Rob from Cubs stood down from Cubs in July, Rob has been with us for 4 years and took a very active part in every aspect of Scouting and even persuaded his wife to become our treasurer, we miss you already Rob!

Scouting is currently going through a number of changes, new database, new compliance on training and changes in the structures of the Leader Teams. While implementing the changes, the Leaders have insured that Scouting at Hoveton and Wroxham has continued at the high level that is expected of them.

I wish to thank each and every one of the Leader Teams, our Board of Trustees members and your families for all the time you give to Scouting.

- **8. Any other business:** The only item was a statement of thanks and gratitude to the Board of Trustees from a parent who attended the meeting
